

## WE REALLY KNOW CATS!



## Cat Welfare has been the preeminent cat shelter in Central Ohio since 1945.

On average, we care for approximately 250 felines each day. Most of our cats are free-roaming throughout the shelter. You will find them in the cupboards, in the sunroom, playing on the cat walks or relaxing in the outdoor secure cat enclosures.

But, here's what really makes Cat Welfare such a special place for cats and kittens...

We strive to find each cat an appropriate, safe and loving home, allowing those not placed to live their lives in the care and comfort of our shelter.




Guided by our Mission Statement, Cat Welfare has rescued, rehabilitated and saved **more than** 30,000 cats and kittens since 1990.

There are many more cats in Central Ohio that need our *immediate* help.


For Cat Welfare to continue to operate at its present level of care for cats and kittens in the foreseeable future, here's what we need to do...

### We Need To EXPAND OUR CURRENT SHELTER


#### **EAST ELEVATION**











The Come to Their Rescue Campaign will allow Cat Welfare to expand our facility utilizing a flexible architectural design structure.

The planned building expansion will increase the shelter size from 5,600 square feet to 11,000 square feet. This additional space is critical to stay true to our mission.

By expanding our current shelter, Cat Welfare will be able to...

# OUR VISION FOR EXPANSION

**DEDICATED SPACE** to take in more kittens that have fragile immune systems and need to be isolated from the general population. Over 700 kittens were admitted to the shelter in 2017.

**PROTECTED SPACE** for cats with FIV or Feline Leukemia. Thanks to advances in medical treatment, these cats can live normal, happy lives and make wonderful companions. However, in a communal environment, their compromised immune systems require separation from the general population.

**ISOLATED SPACE** to respond quickly to disease outbreak, so we're not forced to euthanize these cats.

**MULTI-PURPOSE ROOMS** for acclimating cats, shy cats and felines needing a calm and stress-free environment. Our goal is to familiarize these cats with the shelter surroundings, promote trust and match them with a suitable loving home as appropriate.

**MORE VISITATION AREAS** to allow cats and kittens one-on-one time with individuals, families and children. This interaction is crucial for successful adoptions.



**SPACE TO STORE CRITICAL DONATIONS** such as medical supplies and food donations.

**EDUCATIONAL SPACE** for community outreach programs, cat care seminars, pet advocacy, donor and volunteer recognition.

**SPRINKLER SYSTEM** installed throughout the existing building and new addition.

# WE NEED YOUR HELP

## Cat Welfare needs *your help* to alleviate the pressures of operating at full capacity in our current shelter.

- Cat Welfare honors its Mission Statement by accepting all pregnant or injured cats at all times – even at full capacity.
- Cat Welfare accepts the return of cats adopted from Cat Welfare
   even at full capacity.
- Unwanted cats and kittens are routinely abandoned at our door.
   Cat Welfare has no other option but to open our shelter to these unfortunate felines even if we are at full capacity.

In 2017, we received approximately 13,000 inquiries from people desiring to surrender *stray*, *homeless* cats and kittens. Cat Welfare doesn't have the space to house them all and we have to turn away many cats. We need more space so we can keep more cats off the streets and in the safety of the shelter until they find their forever homes. With your help, we can better serve the compelling needs of these *abandoned felines*.

For these reasons, we are exploring a \$3 million capital campaign to expand our facility on our existing property.







Many of the stray cats admitted to the shelter come from the worst possible conditions. In 2014, an incoming cat was diagnosed with Trichomonas Foetus (Tritrich), a highly contagious disease. Approximately 200 cats in our shelter were exposed to the disease. Fortunately, only 20 cats tested positive. As a no-kill shelter, we quickly restructured space in our current facility to quarantine the 20 cats during their one-year treatment protocol.

We were lucky we could accommodate those cats. However, what if more cats had been infected? This new addition will ensure that we have the *flexible space* to address unexpected situations.

Many shelters choose to euthanize ill cats. We choose to heal.

## OUR CURRENT PROGRAMS & SUCCESSES

Because of the generosity and commitment of our donors, members, volunteers, dedicated staff and Board of Directors, we accomplished the following in 2017 alone:

In 2017 1,615 cats and kittens admitted to the shelter, many with serious injuries.

**Our adoption program has been growing by leaps and bounds.** Our cats are available for adoption by loving and appropriate individuals or families. Adoption fees are \$20 for cats and kittens and \$10 for cats 8 years and older. Cats and kittens eligible for adoption are microchipped, spayed or neutered and receive the appropriate vaccinations and tests.


1,368 cats and kittens adopted in 2017.

In 2017

24 FIV positive cats adopted to loving homes.

After feeding Mr. Minx as a stray, we decided to rescue him and took him to the vet. Cat Welfare helped us tremendously with the vet fees and guided us in the right direction. It took time to get close to him, but eventually Mr. Minx was comfortable with our family. He has been through a lot he can't walk in a straight line, he has one tooth, his tail has been broken in several spots, and one of his ears is mangled. But Mr. Minx is now thriving, and has become my best friend. I will always be grateful to Cat Welfare for all the love, support and care they provided.

As part of our spay and neuter programs, we provide financial assistance to low-income families to make sure cats are spayed and neutered as part of our overpopulation prevention efforts.

In 2017 2,058 altering surgeries subsidized through Cat Welfare's low-cost spay and neuter programs.



kittens cared for in foster homes in 2017.

As part of our foster care program, our volunteers provide care in their homes for stray kittens (with or without mom). Kittens are returned to the shelter for adoption when they weigh at least 2 pounds. Foster care is also provided for special needs cats until adoption is feasible.

**In 2017** 

non-shelter cats received \$25,625 in emergency medical treatment paid from Joey's Good Sam Fund.

Our Joey's Good Sam Fund subsidizes veterinary care for cat owners who cannot afford medical treatment for their companion cats.
